

July Ramble



Many thanks to Bill and Margaret for opening their home to us for the July ramble. It was great to learn so much and to have the opportunity to socialize with so many of our new and “old” members. A good time was had by all.

As shown above, the dendrobiums are in a group on the screened patio, receiving diffused sunlight most of the day. The dens are planted in staylite or lava rock, because it never breaks down. Then repotting, which dens don't like, is not so traumatic to the root system. It also helps stabilize the pots, since many of her dendrobiums are huge.

The schomburgkias hang outside in full sun with no screen protection.





The vandas are grown hanging at the highest point on the screened patio, since they want the most sunlight and have long dangling roots. Behind them in a section that has two layers of screen are the cattleyas, which need less sunlight.

Some oncidiums and epidendrums thrive nicely outside elevated on trays, receiving direct or indirect sunlight for a short duration most summer days.
