Keeping Track of Your Orchids

Last month Charlie Scholes talked about his method of keeping track of his orchids: names, parentage, blooming period, repotting, fertilizing, etc. You'll find many of our members who are serious growers (or just anal) have developed their own process for keeping track of their plants, and the systems are as varied as the people who use them. This month I'm going to talk about my method of orchid record-keeping.

I use Word and keep my records in a File Explorer document folder.

• The primary folder is entitled simply "Orchids" and contains internal folders that list the various genre of orchids that are in my collection, such as Beallara, Brassavola, Catasedium, Cattleya, Dendrobium, Encyclia, Vanda, etc.

- 1. I have 24 folders. One of them is a DEAD folder to keep the info on plants that have committed suicide, just in case I get/want another one.
- 2. I use the genre folders to collate all the orchids I have recorded, which helps me know their genre. For ex ample, I have several small vanda orchids identified as Ascocenda. The genre was changed to Vanda so all my Asconcendas are under the Vanda file and I know how to classify them for registration. I have lots of miniature orchids filed under their genre and under Miniatures so they can be registered as both.
- Next in the primary folder is a file entitled AAA Individual Orchid Sheet that is the boilerplate file I use to rec-
- ord new purchases and then save under the name of the orchid. AAA keeps it at the top of the files list.
- Following are all the files of orchids that I have recorded.

Components of the info sheet:

• As you can see, the file includes the name of the cattleya hybrid with the date it was registered (I kind of like to know

how old it is). If it's a hybrid without a name I list both parents as the plant name and save it as such.

• Next is the parentage which is great to have when registering your plant for the show. If the name is not on the tag, I first look on google to find the parents and then check with the Royal Horticultural Society to verify the information is correct.

• The date/received lets me know how long I've had it and where I got it. If I purchase it, I put the vendor and the price. If was given to me I write the name of the person so I know who to go to if I have questions.

- In awards I list AOS and any personal awards I have received in the various shows.
- Growing notes may be short or longer, depending upon how much I need to know about the plant. I also copy growing notes off the internet and notes from our monthly speakers for the various genres and put them in the genre folders listed previously.

• The picture helps me identify the plant if it's blooming and I have unfortunately lost the name tag. Initially the pic may be from the internet but I try to replace it with a picture I've taken of the plant in bloom because they sometimes look different. If I don't have the name then I put two pictures, one of each parent.

So, that's my system. It works for me but maybe not others. Let me know if you have any questions. Laura
